








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Rising Together to Reach Further

7. Centricity of Impact


All efforts, however well-intentioned, must be measured by the yardstick of bringing positive impact on beneficiaries – visible, acknowledged & happiness enhancing.

Engineering Dreams Take Flight

Siddharth Bhuva joined Adani Vidya Mandir, Ahmedabad in the academic year 2011-12. He grew into an inquisitive learner and found many ways to express himself through theatre, elocution competition, debates, etc. The Olympiads, computer classes and school's club activities further fuelled his passion for science. In class 11, recognizing his aspiration, he was selected and sponsored for Joint Entrance Examination (JEE) coaching. He was counselled and mentored to be a successful candidate. Siddharth went on to secure All India Rank (AIR) 171 and stood 10th in EWS in JEE Advanced 2021, securing admission in Computer Science stream in his dream college – IIT Mumbai.



Marking Many Firsts

In 2022, Adani Vidya Mandir, Bhadreshwar became the first Gujarat State Education Board (GSEB) affiliated, Gujarati medium school in Gujarat to receive accreditation from National Accreditation Board for Education and Training (NABET) under Quality Council of India (QCI). Earlier in 2019, Adani Vidya Mandir, Ahmedabad became the first private school in the city to achieve this feat.






Striking twice at the State Level

Utthan in Gujarat

Utthan aims to **improve foundational literacy and numeracy** among students by adopting government primary schools. It focuses on **mainstreaming Priya Vidyarthis** (progressive learners) and enabling holistic development of the schools. An **Utthan Sahayak** (supplementary teacher) is appointed in each school who acts as a catalyst and facilitator.



FY 2021-22 Outreach

- All 66 schools are equipped with smart classrooms, reading corners, sports equipment, and music instruments
- 100 hours capacity building programmes for Utthan sahayaks and school teachers
- 660 mothers' meets conducted during the year with average 90% attendance

Utthan At Dhamra, Odisha

Utthan in Dhamra is implemented in collaboration with ThinkZone under the aegis of MoSchool Abhiyaan. It is a technology-driven programme to enhance the quality of pre-primary and primary education.

Highlights of the Year

Project Utthan was launched in Mumbai on November 15, 2021. It is designed to enable children from underprivileged households to complete their secondary education with improved academic outcomes. Based on a ground level survey, four centres have been started in Lokhande Marg, Vashi Naka, Ghatla, and Shastri Nagar.









Project Taaleem imparts primary education to the children of refugee and migrant communities through an Active Story-Based Learning Curriculum. Under this project, the Adani Foundation in collaboration with ENACTUS DCAC (Delhi College of Arts and Commerce) has facilitated two learning centres in Delhi, benefitting 230 children.

Gyanodaya, Godda

Gyanodaya is a digital learning programme transforming the face of education in Jharkhand's **Godda – an aspirational district**. The initiative is powered by the Adani Foundation in collaboration with Godda District Administration and Eckovation Solutions Pvt. Ltd.

Government-run schools are the biggest providers of education in Jharkhand. Students suffer due to:

- Limitations in curriculum and pedagogy
- Limited physical and digital infrastructure
- Lack of qualified teachers

How Gyanodaya is Innovating in Godda

- ◆ Contextualized digital content: Jharkhand Board curriculum is converted into animated videos and video lectures - adapted to local context.
- ◆ Multiplatform content delivery: The contextualized content is delivered to classrooms in the form of a pen drive attached to LCD television. It can be also accessed through the Gyanodaya Godda Mera Mobile Mera Vidyalaya application. It enables students to connect with subject experts who are readily available for doubt solving.
- ◆ Teachers as facilitators: Government school teachers are trained to conduct classes using the audio-video content, and run Al supported assessments.
- Continual student assessment: Data points from biweekly assessments help students to correct and improve.






- Since the start of Gyanodaya, the Godda district has risen to 11th position, up ten spots from 21st, in the Class 10 board examination rankings in Jharkhand.



Mobile Health Care Units

- Quality healthcare services reach the doorsteps of needy groups in remote villages.
- Armed with generic medicines and basic diagnostic tools, qualified medical professionals treat patients and refer those requiring further testing and care to the nearest medical facility.
- In FY 2021-22, 17 MHCUs ensured population coverage of **8,00,000** people.
- They provided 2,88,106 treatments and healthcare services at 12 CSR sites across India.
- The MHCUs provide portable ECG machine services, which were availed by 251 patients, out of which lives of 10 persons could be saved. They were having severe heart-related disorders and were referred for further diagnosis and treatment in a timely manner.





Dema Umed lives in Pragpar village of Mundra with her husband and two daughters. One of her daughters is mentally challenged and completely dependent on her for care. Her husband, who works as a daily wage labourer in farms, is the sole bread earner. Making ends meet is always far from reach. These conditions led to Dema developing hypertension, which was undiagnosed until Dr. Mukesh Parmar inspected her health. Her blood pressure was 197/97 mm hg. He immediately started symptomatic treatment and later during the second follow-up, he started anti-hypertensive treatment by providing the required medicines and advised her on some lifestyle and dietary changes. On regular follow-up check-ups, Dema was evidently on the road to recovery. She says this healthcare service is "like an oasis in a desert".

Health Camps

- Providing the right health screenings and generating awareness alongside necessary treatment/referrals.
- According to the observations, general and specialized health camps for cancer screening, gynaecology, and paediatrics are held.
- In FY 2021-22, **22,973** people received direct benefits from in **183** health camps, 87 general health camps (12,503), 96 specialized health camps (10,470).



Rural Clinics

- Rural clinics and wellness centres reduce travel time, hardships and expenses incurred by people living in interior villages in Mundra, Dhamra, Krishnapatnam, Surguja and Raigarh.
- General life-saving medicines and equipment for blood pressure check-up, electrocardiogram, and random blood sugar (RBS) testing facilities are available.
- In FY 2021-22, a total of 16 such clinics and centres catered to around 29,233 patients.



Gujarat Adani Institute of Medical Sciences (GAIMS), Bhuj

- The only medical college and multi-specialty modern teaching hospital in Kutch district.
- First Public-Private-Partnership (PPP) endeavour between the Government of Gujarat and the Adani Education & Research Foundation, providing medical care at subsidized rates.

 - » 128 health camps conducted across 7 villages in Bhuj, treating 7,027 patients.



Adani Hospital, Mundra

- ◆ A 100-bed secondary care hospital catering to the healthcare needs of local population of Mundra and neighbouring areas.
- Providing financial assistance to the most economically-challenged patients who are suffering from life-threatening diseases related to heart, liver, kidney, and cancer cases.
- In FY 2021-22, **29,655** patients visited the Out-Patient Department and **1,636** visited the In-Patient Department.



Exploring Synergies



In FY 2021-22, the Adani Foundation partnered with Apollo Foundation to bring Total Health Programme to Krishnapatnam, Andhra Pradesh. The community members' health will benefit in a holistic manner from the best-in-class technology for diagnosis and treatment.

COVID Relief and Care

In March 2020, the outbreak of coronavirus marked the beginning of an unprecedented time in modern history. The Foundation's relief efforts continued into FY 2021-22 to safeguard communities amid grave adversities brought upon by subsequent pandemic waves.



- Upgraded facilities at Gujarat Adani Institute of Medical Sciences (GAIMS), Bhuj with 500 oxygen beds, 4 oxygen plants & liquid medical oxygen tanks.
- Converted Adani Hospital, Mundra into a **50-bed COVID hospital** fully-equipped with oxygen facility that catered to 554 patients.
- Converted Adani Vidya Mandir, Ahmedabad (AVMA) into a 24*7 emergency COVID Care Centre with oxygen support.
- Converted Noida Indoor Stadium and Shooting Range into a 50-bed COVID care facility equipped with doctors, nurses, paramedics and patient support staff.







- Created a COVID Care Centre in Navayuga World School, Krishnapatnam, Andhra Pradesh.
- Set up two COVID First-Line Treatment Centres (CFLTC) in Kerala with a combined capacity of 500 beds by working alongside the government.
- Installed 11 oxygen plants, 57 oxygen tanks, **9,050** oxygen cylinders (of which 7,100 were imported & 1,950 were procured domestically) and 416 concentrators in various parts of India.
- Served **8,05,380** meals at four "Aahar Kendra" in Ahmedabad, Gujarat keeping in mind the health and nutrition of those who lost their source of livelihood amid COVID.









Agriculture

The Adani Foundation is working with marginal and small farmers. It helps them in upgrading their farming skills through improved cropping practices and crop diversification, leading to reduction in both external inputs and cost of cultivation and doubling their income.

Paddy Cultivation through SRI Method

System of Rice Intensification (SRI) is a low water, less labour-intensive method of paddy cultivation. The activity was carried out at six sites in Tirora, Surguja, Raigarh, Raipur, Dhamra and Kattupalli. **714 farmers** used SRI method on **991 acres**. Average increase in yield was 29%.

Production increase in quintal/acre 3.92

Net benefit/acre in INR **9,005** Total benefit in INR **89,23,460**



Ashesh Kumar Das (46), a farmer from Kuamara village of Bhadrak district in Odisha attended 6 trainings on SRI. He implemented this method on his 2.5 acres of farmland. It has saved him input costs as the requirement of seeds has reduced and so has the number of person-days.



Vegetable, Jasmine, and Other Cash Crops Cultivation

The Foundation supports farmers and women SHG groups in cultivating vegetables like onion, cauliflower, and elephant fruit jam, and floriculture like jasmine plantation. The initiative provides assured source of income. **Total beneficiaries are 1,914 who did cultivation on 194 acres.**

- At Dahanu, 702 families cultivated jasmine on 131 acres and earned an annual income of INR 19,000-45,000. Through vegetable cultivation families are now earning INR 19,000-35,000 per year. Enhanced and regular income has helped reduce migration from Dahanu block by up to 90%.
- At Dhamra, many farmers are cultivating cauliflower, elephant fruit jam and onion, benefitting 333 farmers and covering 30 acres of farmland.
- At Vizhinjam, Kattupalli and Krishnapatnam, women SHG members are cultivating vegetables at their homesteads by using growbags provided by the Adani Foundation. 760 women cultivated vegetables on 7.5 acres (homestead) in Vizhinjam; 20 farmers on 5 acres at Kawai; 100 farmers on 20 acres at Surguja.
- At Godda, 13 farmers are cultivating lemongrass on 21 acres.
- ◆ At Tirora, 200 farmers were imparted training on lac cultivation and provided with lac inoculation kits.

Wadi Project




Under Wadi Project in Dahanu (Maharashtra), 1,000 landholding and 100 landless families of 11 villages in Dahanu block were identified to empower and to make them self-sufficient through horti-forestry and agriculture-based interventions. More than 500 acres of land has been brought under cultivation. Income enhanced by 60% for land owning families and 45% for landless families.

Date Palm Cultivation:

Facilitated a farmer producer organization (FPO) in Mundra for cultivating and marketing premium quality dates. The turnover of the FPO, Kutch Kalpataru Farmer Producer Organization, for this FY is INR 24 lakh; total 1,800 farmers are associated with this FPO.



Enhancing Agricultural Efficiency



Production of Vermicompost: 598 farmers are actively involved in vermicomposting with average yearly income of INR 32,000 per farmer.



Drip Irrigation: 963 acres were covered under drip irrigation this financial year, taking the total average to **9,400**; average increase in yearly income/acre INR 40,000 to 50,000/-.

Installation of Biogas Plants: 123 biogas units were installed at three sites in Mundra (104 units), Tirora (18 units), and Kawai (1 unit).



Environmental Conservation

- In this financial year, **45,60,717 trees**, including mangrove plantation in Mundra, was carried out on 731-acre area; a total of 52,000 person-days jobs were created for the local community.
- In Kawai, a bio-diversity park was developed on 100 acres with the support of Kunjed gram panchayat.
- At Mundra, a Miyawaki forest has been developed on two acres of barren land; 4,965 saplings were planted.
- In Hazira, 9 Solar Pumps each of 5 HP capacity installed as an eco-friendly alternative to fulfil the last mile requirement of pumping water. This has benefitted 301 farmers in Bhandut village holding a total of 488 bighas of land. In the last 6 months, they have saved INR 1,00,000 on fuel expenses.



Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi inaugurated the Varanasi **Bio-Conversion Project on** 12 December 2021. Dignitaries, including

chief ministers of 12 states, visited the biogas plant in Shahanshapur.





Livestock and Dairy Development Programme

Livestock development at 12 sites includes cattle breed improvement, vaccination, treatment, fodder cultivation and dairy development, etc.

Conducted **8,037** artificial insemination, including sex sorted semen.

Helped in 1,160 calving.

Treated 20,966 animals at 106 cattle health check-up camps.

Helped in fodder cultivation on 1,262 plots covering 240 acres land.

At Tirora, Amul (Panchmahal Dairy) has started procuring milk from Anuradha Dairy managed by 72 women SHG members. 7,000 litres of milk are collected every day and sent to 3 bulk cooling centres, all managed by women. INR 80 to 90 lakh is the monthly turnover of Anuradha Dairy. At Surguja, a women's SHG started a dairy unit and

At Surguja, a women's SHG started a dairy unit and is managing around 125 litres of milk per day.



Enabling Women-led Enterprises

Empowering women to achieve self-reliance is a major area of focus to accelerate sustainable development. In FY 2021-22, 2,628 women in self-help groups (SHGs) and farmer producer organizations (FPOs) were engaged in various livelihood generating activities, earning more than INR 6.4 crore. These activities include mushroom cultivation, running canteens, detergent and phenyl making, snack making, handicrafts, incense stick making, laundry services, cleaning services, stitching, dairy operations, and village-level milk collection.

Vizmart (Vizhinjam, Kerala)

It is a marketplace for women-led livelihood groups. It has shops and kiosks for various products and services.

This FY's income is INR 60.63 lakh: cumulative income is INR 440 lakh.







Mushroom Cultivation

The programme is being implemented at Tirora, Raigarh and Dhamra sites.

In all, 703 women SHG members were trained by the Adani Foundation and are cultivating oyster and paddy straw mushrooms.

In this FY, total earning was INR 22.58 lakh.



Pratima Chaudhari from Tirora is cultivating mushroom since 2018. She earns INR 4,000 per month during October-March every year.



Mahila Udyami Bahuddeshiya Sahakari Samaiti (MUBSS)

MUBSS was started in 2016 with 250 members from 10 villages in Surguja (Chhattisgarh). The women-run different businesses under MUBSS – dairy, mid-day meal, spice grinding unit, vermicomposting, etc.

The FY 2021-22, turnover is INR 98.78 lakh; cumulative turnover is INR 454.37 lakh.



Veena Devangan heads a masala griding unit. She earns INR 10,000-12,000 per month. She has enrolled in class 12 and plans to pursue bachelor's degree in science.





Creating Cooperatives & Companies

The Adani Foundation is facilitating farmers and women entrepreneurs to register as federations, such as companies and producer clubs. These include but are not limited to:

Building Facilities

Community infrastructure projects contribute towards accelerating outcomes related to health, education, and sustainable livelihoods by augmenting the existing facilities. This support has further improved standard of living of the communities and opened new opportunities for economic growth.

Water-related Projects

Water Conservation

10 ponds have been deepened and developed in Tirora, Hazira, Dhamra, Dahej, and Kawai which has enhanced the total storage capacity of 1,14,285 cu. mt.

88 well and borewell recharge projects were carried out at Mundra and Tirora.

Drinking Water Facilities

57 borewell (some including handpump) were installed in Tirora, Godda, Dhamra, and Kawai.

5 RO plants with shed were installed in Kattupali, Dahanu, and Vizhinjam.

50 Rooftop Rainwater Harvesting structures were installed in Mundra, fulfilling drinking water requirement of 50 families by building collection capacity of 5,00,000-liter of rainwater.



Village Development Works

Construction of 10 cement concrete roads of 4.02 km at 4 locations - Dhamra, Kawai, Raipur and Tirora.







Construction of 23 shelters for fisherfolk at Randh Bandar and 4 rooms for community gathering at Wandi in Mundra.



Construction of Damka Community Hall and installation of 20KW capacity of solar panel at a community hall at Palsana in Hazira.



Installation of 7 high mast lights at 3 locations -Dhamra, Mundra and Kattupali. Installation of 776 LED lights across Mundra, Raipur and Nakhatrana.

SuPoshan is a community-based nutrition intervention project of Adani Wilmar Ltd., under the Adani Foundation's health intervention that:

- Curbs the intergenerational cycle of malnutrition in sync with the government's indicators
- Strengthens the health & nutritional status of children (0- 5 years) with timely identification of acute malnourished children and reinforcing referrals
- Creates nutrition and maternal care awareness in adolescent girls, pregnant and lactating women
- Empowers community women as SuPoshan Sanginis to facilitate sustainable behavioural change as well as access to the government's services

Celebrating Good Nutrition through the Year

National Nutrition Month (Poshan Maah) is celebrated in September every year under the aegis of Government of India's Poshan Abhiyaan. During Poshan Maah 2021, our ceaseless efforts reached 56,264 community members in over 640 villages across 12 Indian states.

SuPoshan works with new and expectant mothers across CSR sites to encourage proper breastfeeding practices. During World Breastfeeding Week (August 1 to 7, 2021), our Sanginis reached out to **17,028 mothers**.















The Ministry of Women and Child Development celebrated the 4th Poshan Pakhwada from 21 March to 4 April 2022. During this time, our efforts reached over 60,000 women and children.

Marching on with Self-reliance

The objective of SuPoshan project is to establish Sanginis as a well-trained and empowered resource, who contributes to her family and community at large.

In Kawai (Rajasthan), 22 Sanginis are involved in the Adani Foundation's SaHAJ project for manufacturing & distribution of sanitary napkins in villages. They earn INR 3,000 to 5,000 each per month.

In Tirora (Maharashtra), 32 Sanginis are working in dairy industry, mushroom cultivation, lac bangle making, flour mill, etc. They earn INR 3,000 to 8,000 each per month. One Sangini, Pushpalata K Gautam, has been nominated as Sarpanch!





Out of total 167 Sanginis who exited the project, 152 Sanginis were approached to check their present status.

Of these 152, 109
(72%) Sanginis are
working in different
areas. They are
earning between
INR 200 and
INR 15,000, making
average monthly
income of INR 4,000.

97 (89%) of the working Sanginis are still approached by community seeking support for health and nutrition-related issues.

43 (28%) Sanginis at present are not working. Of these, **20 (46%)** are still approached by community for assistance with malnutrition-related issues.



About 48% working Sanginis are involved in more than one sector.

Recovering and Rebuilding

The COVID pandemic delayed and derailed the output of many health and nutrition interventions, but it also brought more attention to these very social development indicators.

Our SuPoshan Sanginis reached out to **4,766 beneficiaries** through telephonic consultations in FY 2021-22.

41 SuPoshan Sanginis completed virtual training on Early Childhood Development (ECD), Nutrition, MIS, and web applications.











Our SuPoshan Sanginis were the first frontline workers to begin work during the pandemic. They started screening and counselling children below 5 years of age and ensured that severely malnourished children were referred to Nutrition Rehabilitation Centres (NRC) once they reopened. They also helped anganwadi centres distribute Take-Home Ration (THR) to the people.



Easy to grow, access, use and increase dietary diversity, **3,000 nutri gardens were developed** during the reporting year, helping families to enhance their nutritional security.







Imparting Skills

Through **Adani Skill Development Centres (ASDCs)**, Saksham is bringing world-class training programmes equipped with augmented reality and virtual reality (AR-VR) to the Indian youth. The course curricula are aligned with the Skill India Mission and the vision of Atmanirbhar Bharat.

About the event:

The Swachhagraha campaign was implemented in January 2022 to spread awareness on cleanliness among travellers and visitors through hoardings, stickers, selfie corners, mirror posters, signages, banners with creative messages at domestic and international airports, and outside airport premises.

Udaan

Udaan was inspired by the lifechanging story of **Mr. Gautam Adani, Chairman of the Adani Group**, who had visited the Kandla port in Gujarat for the first time as a kid. Looking at the expanse of the port, he dreamt of having his own port one day. The rest is history.

Project Udaan is a learning-based initiative focused on the youth of the nation. Under this project, exposure tours are organized wherein students visit the Adani Port, Adani Power & Adani Wilmar facilities at the Adani Group sites. These trips provide the students working insights into large-scale business operations and serve to inspire them to dream big in life.





This year, the Adani Foundation signed an MoU with the Government of Gujarat under which exposure tours will be organized for school and college students (technical and non-technical) to visit and explore Adani Group facilities. The Gujarat education department will recommend Project Udaan to all technical and higher education colleges, universities, and schools (classes 9-12) – government, grant-in-aid and self-financed.

Employee Volunteering Programme

Till date, the Adani Group's workforce has spent over **3,100 person days** on employee volunteering initiatives across the country. In the reporting financial year, employees came forward to do their bit for social causes; over **1,350 human-hours** of work has been done at **9 locations**.

The activities that were selected for volunteering range from COVID-19 relief work to Cyclone relief work. Employees worked on projects to support Divyang and related causes, online training, civil works, oxygen plant set-up, health camps, distribution of essential items, and pledged to eradicate Tuberculosis (TB).
